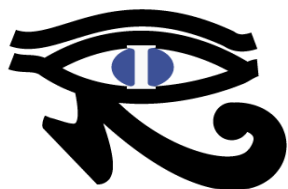

Our two day discussion focuses on the impact of information and authentication technologies on our identity, and on our ability to be anonymous. 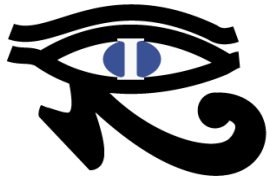

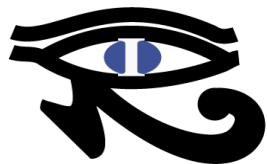
